


Get Started With Classical Music: Part 1

The best way to get started is simple: **start listening**! The more you listen to classical music, the more familiar you will become with the sounds of different instruments, the composition styles of different composers, the differences between subgenres (such as a piano concerto and a piano sonata), and the many subtleties that are to be found within any given classical music work.

Classical music history is broken down into several different eras, based on general shifts in (Western) society (note: other cultures have their own traditions of classical music). The music composed during each era reflects aspects such as the availability of different instruments, the different contexts in which music was performed, the musical tastes of the time (and advancing towards the future), elements of society, and aspects of the composer's own life. The main time divisions to be familiar with are:



Here are some suggestions of composers and works to get you started for each of these eras. Listen to the works and read about the composers. Note: Some of the composers lived and worked during transitory times between two eras, so you may find that sometimes they may be categorised as belonging to a different era.
